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



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
- Distributed 21,978 essential vitamins that are crucial to enhancing immunity and growth and preventing infections caused by tapeworms
- Conducted 948 health assessments (measuring the height, weight, and mid-upper arm circumference of each child to assess if they are malnourished)
- Educated 406 caregivers on health issues and various other parenting topics
- Graduated 98 clients from our Outreach Program



The TTL Safe Home is a place where we temporarily rehabilitate children who are facing the most severe cases of malnutrition, who have serious health concerns that need to be addressed, or who may have no other place to go. This year, we temporarily **housed 35 children in the Safe Home**. We have excellent staff who provide exceptional 24-hour care to the children, ensuring the best opportunity for them to grow and thrive. A typical day for a child in the Safe Home includes 6 meals that contain the

necessary nutrients to promote growth and healthy development, daily doses of vitamins, as well as clinic visits for any medical needs. There is also plenty of time for play to promote and enhance the development of social and motor skills. When a child has reached a healthy and stable weight and has progressed in their respective milestones, they are reunited with their families and become clients in our Outreach Program. This year, we reunified 24 children with their families.









# A long but successful journey...

This year, TTL assisted a family in dire need. Their son, Limpho (name changed to protect privacy), at only a year and a half old, was suffering from malnutrition and living with challenges from being born with a cleft palate. TTL stepped in at the request of the family, helped support him in the TTL Safe Home to combat his malnutrition, assisted him and his mother

in getting passports to travel to South
Africa for doctors appointments, and then
transported them to Bloemfontein
Hospital, South Africa for cleft palate
surgery and all his appointments pre- and
post- operation. This little guy was
amazing throughout the entire process
and his family was overjoyed by the
improvements they saw in their son after
his recovery. He is much happier now and
thriving because he was able to get the
help he so desperately needed.

# Learning and adjusting

Thankfully, we are seeing fewer children come to us because they have contracted HIV and fewer children orphaned because of AIDS. However, we have noticed an increase in food insecurity and malnutrition. We are partnering with ECD schools to help deliver nutritious foods to children under five every day and to create new avenues for referrals to Outreach and the Safe Home for those most in need. We are excited about these developments and look forward to piloting some ambitious programs in 2023.
